Teddy bears we love

- Small enough for children to carry
- Clean and in good condition
- They do not emit a noise of any type (this could compromise the child's safety if it made a sound)
- Cuddly, soft and comforting

Other soft toys we don't

- Extra large teddy bears (teddy bears exceeding 38 cm/15 inches)
- Teddy bears with mechanisms or batteries inside, and anything that makes a noise
- Branded goods or toys
- Animals other than bears
- Also, no dolls, knitted toys, beanie animals, monsters, pigs, nylon pillows, snakes, or keyrings

This is completely voluntary, and we are so proud of our pupils for showing such compassion!

Swallows Class

This term, we have been exploring a range of exciting topics and celebrations. Towards the end of October and in November, we learned about **Remembrance Day** and why it is commemorated, as well as discovering how **Diwali** is celebrated. The children enjoyed creating their own beautiful **Rangoli art** and making **Diya lamps** to mark the festival. Throughout the term we have focused on the work of the famous artist **Wassily Kandinsky**, studying his use of primary colours and concentric circles. We explored concentric circles in nature and even recreated them during **Forest School** using natural materials. Throughout these sessions, the children experimented with a variety of media, including oil pastels and watercolours. Kandinsky's work has also inspired us to look more closely at shapes—circles, squares, and rectangles.





Skylarks Class

Skylarks have been learning all about measuring in maths! Over the last few weeks they have measured length, weight, capacity and find out about how to do this more accurately now they are older. In art this term, the children are finding out about the work of Paul Klee and in particular his work Castle and Sun. They have found out how to use line and texture to fill a space and are building towards their final piece. We can't wait to see what they create!















Goldfinch Class

Goldfinch Class have been busy exploring patterns in multiplication during maths, learning how to spot and explain these patterns with confidence. In art, they are studying DaVinci paintings, specifically the Mona Lisa and The Last Supper and have been developing their sketching and shading techniques to create accurate drawings of people, paying close attention to proportion, detail and blending from dark to light to work towards making a self-portraits that combines all the skills they have worked on. Meanwhile, in computing, the children have loved planning and creating their own stop-motion videos, carefully crafting a beginning, middle, and end to bring their ideas to life.













Swift Class

Swift Class started the term exploring the question 'Can we bend the sun's rays?' The children used the idea of light travelling in a straight line to investigate how shadows are formed; setting up their own investigations. Continuing with their application of scientific enquiry skills, the children then made their own periscopes to answer how light travelling in straight lines and reflecting enables us to see.

In PE, the children have been learning about skills and tactics that can be applied to a range of invasion games: including hockey and netball.







Mrs Tranter

We wanted to share with you the news that the wonderful Mrs Tranter had decided to hang up her teaching assistant boots and retire at the end of the Autumn term. Mrs Tranter has worked at Longney School for 30 years and is one of the most enthusiastic and caring TAs I have ever worked with. She has worked in a host of roles including caretaker, cleaner, midday supervisor, breakfast club leader and teaching assistant and has worked across all the classes at some point in her time here.
