#### **Curriculum News!**

This term the children have had some fantastic curriculum experiences. We have updated the Longney curriculum in line with three key curriculum drivers which have helped us to frame what we want for the children of Longney in line with our vision for the school – Building community, enriching lives. Mr LeTemplier is in the process of updating the school website with all the new information and we will let you know in the new year when this has been completed so you can take a more detailed look. Our main focuses for this term have been history, art and science with other lessons happening weekly. Next term we will focus on geography and D&T with some exciting projects ahead including map work in the local community.

#### History

In our History learning this term, the children have been learning about a range of periods through history ranging from changes within our living memory to prehistory. In Skylarks, children have been developing a sense of chronology and thinking about how things have changed in our lifetimes. They have looked at different sources of information to make comparisons between then and now. Goldfinch class have been going much further back in their History lessons, as they have been learning about prehistory - focussing on the stone age, iron age and bronze age. The children have been investigating a range of historical sources, including a 3D tour of Skara Brae, to make connections between the different periods. Meanwhile, in Swift class, the children have been learning about World War 2 and the impact this had on Britain. This included looking at the impact the war had on different people as well as our local area.

#### Art

In Art, all of the children have been learning and refining a range of drawing and sketching skills, appropriate to their age and ability. In Skylark class, the children used a range of materials to practise different drawing techniques. Towards the end of term, they were challenged to use their observation skills to draw a self-portrait. In Goldfinch class, the children built upon their existing knowledge to create observational pieces in the style of Paul Cezanne. The children learnt how to create light and dark through shading and used this to create some excellent drawings. In Swift class, they were learning how to consider tone and shadow when drawing in 3D. The children also learnt how to use perspective to show foreground, middle ground and background in their final pieces of work.

#### Science

At the start of term, we all enjoyed conducting a range of experiments as part of our science weeks. In Skylark, the children met Miss Hoskin's 'pet rock' as part of their learning about living things. Throughout the week, the children considered what characteristics made something 'alive', such as movement, growth and reproduction. In Goldfinch, the children looked at what happens to our food and took a journey through the digestive system. The children learned about the function of the teeth as well as getting messy when recreating their own digestive system using tights! In Swift class, the children took an in-depth look at light and how it travels. The children had a great time learning about how light travels in lines and can be reflected to solve problems, such as when using periscopes.

Science weeks will take place at the start of each half term throughout the year with the children answering a scientific question to engage their curiosity each time.

## **Sporting Events**

This term the children have represented the school in a range of sporting activities as follows:

Y5/6 girls' football - A team of 10 girls went to Oldends Lane to take part in a girls' football festival. Our Longney girls were part of a group of over 200 children, who came together to celebrate girls' sport. They spent some time practising football skills before playing matches against local schools.

KS2 football tournament - We took a Y3/4 team and a Y5/6 team to Oldends Lane to take part in the small schools' football tournament. Both teams played in 6 matches across the morning, showing true perseverance and courage.

Y5/6 netball - A team of 7 Y5/6 children went to Stratford Park to take part in a Y5/6 netball tournament. The children played against 5 other teams from local schools and they all played in each position from C to GS or GK to GA.





### **School Council**

Last week we held an election for our new school council for this academic year. The children were asked to prepare a short mandate speech at home to present to their classmates with a vote being held shortly after. All of the children who put themselves forward presented wonderfully and came up with some excellent ideas as to how the school can be improved. The voting was very close in all classes and we are proud to introduce our new school council:

## **Values Day**

We have been working hard this term on shaping the school in line with our vision and values.
